A-17 crash site near Albuquerque, NM

GENERAL LOCATION Cibola National Forest, Sandia District, Bear Canyon

HISTORY

This history is taken from the reference. Refer to that for a more detailed crash description.

Returning from a routine training mission, the aircraft was flown eastward into Bear Canyon east of Albuquerque, NM, and crashed up on the canyon wall. A fire ensued destroying the aircraft and creamating (sic) the pilot and passenger. In the Operations Officer's personal opinion "this crash was not due to a mechanical failure."

Many crash explorers have since visited the site where a lot of wreckage remains. This site is more than 50 years old and is in a National Forest, so it is illegal to remove artifacts from this site without special permission from the proper authorities.
