HISTORY

The pilot was making a cargo flight from Roswell, NM, to Albuquerque. The NTSB report indicated that he was flying at 0145 hrs under VFR flight conditions on a very dark night. The report further says, "10MILES S OF COURSE, HIT MTN PEAK. NORMALLY FLEW AIRWAYS." The pilot perished in the crash.

In 2011, crash explorers visited a crash site described to them by a local resident, without knowing anything about the crash history. The site had been scavenged several times by local people. However, the remaining debris convinced the explorers it was a two-engine Piper aircraft. The local people did not supply a crash date, and there is no absolute certainty that the debris found was from PA -23 Aztec, No. N1906T. However, the location in the Gallinas Mountains agrees with the event description and the crash site at the top of a mountain peak fits the NTSB reference. Therefore, this crash site is assumed to be that of the subject airplane.
